A Protocol for Sense-Sensitive Facility Observations

Phase	
Introduce yourself	Introduce yourself to the person in charge and say what the purpose of your inspection is (as appropriate).
Initiate facility walk-through to get first impressions	2. It's important to get on the floor quickly to show interest in care and to reduce the time the facility has available to cover any problems, assuming the facility does this sort of thing. One approach might be to just start with a general greeting, doing a walk-about, engage in further discussion with the person in charge, then continue with in-depth observations and finally you enter the exit stage.
Request a "status" report.	3. Early during the inspection, ask the person in charge about any changes in the facility's operation since your last inspection (staffing changes, physical plant, population, etc).
Pay attention to your hunches.	4. That sixth sense: if something just doesn't feel right to you, pay attention to what is giving you that feeling. Investigate further in that area, but if there is no evidence to support your hunch, don't cite anything.
Other Senses	Pay attention to all your senses:
See	 □ Is the building clean and well maintained? □ What is the staff doing? □ Are required documents posted? □ Is there an activity or a meal-taking place? □ Is an adequate amount of food provided?
Hear	 □ What tone does staff use when speaking to children? □ Are children crying or are there happy sounds of busy children? □ Is staff responding to the signaling system? □ Does the signaling system work? □ Do you hear your arrival being announced on the loudspeaker?
Smell	 □ Do you smell apple pie baking, or something less pleasant? □ Does the building smell like urine, excrement, or stale kitchen odors?
Touch	 □ Are surfaces clean? □ Is the medication storage locked? □ Are emergency doors unlocked? □ How hot is the water? □ Are books, toys, games, utensils, plates, trays clean?
Taste	 □ In most cases, you will rely on the persons in care for this. Ask them whether the food is good. You may need to taste the food (especially if investigating a food complaint), although this probably won't be the first thing you do. NOTE: If you eat an entire meal at the facility, be sure to pay for it so you don't give the impression that you can be influenced

NOTE: What do you do first when you begin an inspection?

- Δ Pay attention to all your senses
- Δ First impressions may help you decide where to focus your time during the inspection
- Δ First impressions may also give you the wrong idea, so be sure to back them up with facts
- Δ What you look at first may tell the licensee what you think is most important (whether or not you intend to convey that message).
